


Using these clues, see if you can spot different bugs and beasties as you walk up to and around the farm! Discover fun facts about them on your journey.


There are six bugs to find.

Once you have tracked them all down, try and spot some real beasties and bugs on the rest of the site.


Beastie is a Scots word for an insect.



The first bug to find is a Worm!




Fun Fact

it's time to find the Slug!**


Can you spot the slug's two small tentacles?
They are used as taste buds and feelers under their eyes.




Next try and spot the Snail

The common garden snail has a top speed of 45 miles per hour!




Hiding next is the Slater, can you find it?

Slaters are related to crabs, prawns and lobsters! They are crustaceans not insects.




Look up to find the Spider

Did you know that there are over 650 species of spider in the UK?


Question:
